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1. Introduction

1.1 Chairman's Statement

It is with pleasure that I present this annual report for the academic year 2008–2009.

A significant addition to the Campus was achieved in this year with the addition of Monkstown Educate Together National School. We welcome them to our campus. We also welcome the opening of the new all-weather pitch, which will provide a significant community resource to the Dún Laoghaire area.

I wish to acknowledge the work, support and commitment of my fellow Governing Body members during the year.

Finally, I wish to thank the staff of the Institute for their commitment and dedication to the Institute and I wish to congratulate them on their achievements. I also wish to acknowledge the contribution of the Governing Body members during this period.

1.2 President's Statement

I am pleased to record substantial progress during the 2008/09 period and I would like to acknowledge the commitment and support of our staff and student body in our achievements. I also acknowledge the valuable support of a wide range of our external stakeholders and the wider community. Their support is all the more important as we see for the first time a downturn in funding as the economy as a whole moves into a recessionary phase.

The completion of the current phase of building and landscaping project has brought the campus to a new level, particularly through the availability for the first time of on-campus playing facilities on the floodlit all-weather pitch. Work is well advanced on planning for the next phase of development, including the National Film School and three buildings to be provided through the PPP programme confirmed by the Minister for Education and Science, the Digital Media Teaching Building, Multi-purpose Hall and Workshops. We particularly welcome the commitment of Government to the achievement of these key infrastructural projects at IADT.

In keeping with our strategic goal of playing a leadership role within the cultural and creative sectors, were very pleased to host the conference 'Creating Futures: Building Ireland's Cultural and Creative Economy'. The international and interinstitutional aspects of our work has also seen continued development, for example through involvement in Strategic Innovation fund projects such as the IoT/DIT



Flexible Learning project and the DRHEA (Dublin Regional Higher Education Alliance), bringing together all HEIs in the Greater Dublin area and through projects such as 'ENGAGE', funded by the EU Media Programme, linking IADT with leading Film Schools in three European countries.

Our engagement with the National Digital Research Centre has also deepened with the funding of a major project. Success in our application to Enterprise Ireland's research fund also provides a welcome boost and will lead to the creation of an advanced visualisation laboratory.

I commend this report to you as a record of the achievements of the outgoing year, also covering on-going strategic developments and plans for future development.

1.3 Establishment of Institute

Dún Laoghaire College of Art and Design, a constituent college of Dún Laoghaire VEC, was granted autonomous status in accordance with the provisions of the Regional Technical Colleges Acts, 1992-1994 with effect from 1 April 1997 by Niamh Bhreathnach TD, Minister for Education. The College changed its name by Ministerial Order to Dún Laoghaire Institute of Art, Design and Technology with effect from 8 January, 1998.




Full-Time Enrolments By Award Level



Overall Part-Time Student Numbers By Award Level



3.7 Student Services & Facilities

3.7.1 Student Services Committee (SSC)

A Student Services Committee (SSC), with joint student and staff membership, was formed in October 1998 to plan, coordinate and implement a variety of programmes and services which are designed to provide students with the opportunity to reach their full academic and personal potential. The SSC is funded by the annual student capitation charge and supports, in whole or in part, the following services:

- Medical service (Doctor and Nurse)
- Counselling service
- Careers Advisory service
- Sports and Recreation Officer
- Writing and Research Skills Workshops
- Students Union
- Clubs and Societies

In addition to the above, the SSC operates a Discretionary Fund to assist students in financial difficulty. All applications are treated with the strictest confidentiality.

Access Office:

 - \circ ethnic minorities / members of the traveller community
 - o lone parents
 - Community initiatives.
- The allocation for the Student Assistance Fund in 2008/2009 was €55,000 a reduction on the 2007/2008 allocation.
- The number of students declaring disabilities in rose from 94 in 2007/2008 to 113 in 2008/2009.
- An IADT Access Strategy was launched on Mach 3rd 2009 by Mary Hanafin TD, Minister for Education and Science.
- The 2008-2013 action plan from the National Access Office (HEA) reflects the need for action and investment throughout the education system. The Plan was launched by the Minister for Education and Science in June 2008.



- The IADT Access Working Group met on 6 occasions during the year, and considered a range of issues relating to access provision for students.
- Building links with local schools continued and in 2008/2009, 36 students from local link schools attended programmes on campus.
- IADT's submission to the Dormant Accounts Initiative Cycle 1 was awarded €167,852 to fund 3 access initiatives DEIS Schools Pre-entry Supports, Outreach Project for Travellers and a Retention Project. A further three projects were submitted for funding to Cycle 2 of this initiative in April 2009.
- The IADT FIS Office and Access Office continue to collaborate on access initiatives such as the FIS Community Digital Media Centre (CDMC). This project, funded through the Dormant Accounts Initiative, was launched in May 2009 by Barry Andrews TD, Minister of State at the Department of Health and Children.
- The Access Office continued to build links with local community groups including the Southside Partnership, Adult Education Office – Dún Laoghaire VEC, Carmona Services, Social Inclusion Unit, Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, and the "Back to Education Initiative, Dún Laoghaire Adult Education Guidance Service.
- In 2008/09 the Fund for Students with Disabilities allocation was €166,186 a reduction on the 2007/2008 figure. The breakdown of applications for support through this fund was as follows:

Assistive Technology:

- The Assistive Technology service supported in excess of 100 students in 2008/2009, using a range of technologies including laptops and dedicated Assistive Technology software.
- The set of Assistive Technologies commonly used include:
 - Hardware Laptops, Electronic dictionary and thesaurus, Scanners for converting text into electronic text and Dictaphones
 - Software Read and Write Gold 8 (Assistive literacy software), Dragon Naturally Speaking 10 (Voice to text dictation software); Inspirations or Mindmanager (Mind mapping software) and MS Word used with its accessibility features.



- Training in the use of assistive technology including training seminars was provided for students. Training seminars offered included Read and Write Gold and Dragon Naturally Speaking, and were well attended. In addition, due to the late allocation of funding, it was necessary to provide an increased level of one-to-one training for first-time applicants.
- To support student training, Student Action Plans (SAP's) were put in place for students. The response to the SAP's was positive and it is intended to continue these in the coming year.
- AT Procurement a combination of site licenses and purchase of software through the CHEST Educational Software Discount Scheme is used to achieve the greatest level of savings possible in relation to software purchasing.

Counselling Service: Annual Report:

- Approximately 8.4% of the registered student population contacted the service directly regarding the scheduling of an initial appointment and from this, 6.7% directly engaged with the student counselling service.
- 111 students engaged in psychotherapeutic contract a steady increase in the number of student referrals.
- 511 direct student consultations were offered during the academic term that ranged from 30 minutes 2 hours.

Nursing Service: Annual Report:

- The Student Health Centre is in its 10th year of operation, providing on-campus medical and nursing care to registered students of IADT.
- Emergency cases are seen as they arise, with non-urgent appointments being generally available within 1-3 days. A €10 charge applies for GP consultations however there are no consultation fees for consultations with the Nurse.
- A total of 2,984 consultations were provided to students during the 2008/2009 academic year, of which 843 were male patient and 2141 female patient consultations. The % of male consultations rose from 27.34% in 2007/2008 to 28.25% in 2008/2009. The months of greatest demand for the service were February and March 2009.
- Areas of importance to students were identified as including family planning, sexual health screening, diagnosis of depression/mental health issues, and chronic conditions.



Writing and Research Service: Annual Report:

The provision of the WRSS reflects the Institute's awareness of the growing diversity of needs among the student population and its policy of inclusion for all its students, including students with a Specific Learning Difficulty (SpLD) and the statutory obligations to accommodate the needs and entitlements of students. The Service operates on a number of levels throughout the Institute to provide a comprehensive range of supports for students, including provision of Needs Assessments, support for funding applications, arrangements for Exam Accommodations, liaising with department heads, course co-ordinators and lecturers over student difficulties.

- The Service objectives are to help students achieve their full potential, reduce demands on staff resources and ensure standards of course requirements are met. This is achieved through a combination of seminars on topics of concern to students, one-to-one tutorials for more particular individual student difficulties, and the provision of support facilities for students with SpLD's/Dyslexia. In addition the Service Coordinator is now qualified as a 'Need Assessor' to complete the necessary Needs Analysis documentation necessary for students applying for funding to the Fund for Students with disabilities.
- This year the Service has extended the service provision to 5 days per week with one evening session also available this allowed the service to accommodate the increase in students seeking the support of the service.
- Seminars offered included seminars on note-taking, reading techniques, essay writing, academic style referencing, research skills, time management, thesis planning, goal setting, deadlines, exam techniques, presentation skills and programme-specific seminars.
- In addition to specialist support, the WRSS offers a screening service on referral from staff in order to clarify what a student's difficulties may be. A definitive diagnosis of Dyslexia/SpLD still requires a full assessment by an educational psychologist.
- The Service works closely with the Access Officer and together ensure that all available funding and supports from the External Funding the National Access Office ESF Fund are activated. However, although 96% of students received funding through the National Access Office, the amount of individual funding received showed a sharp decline.
- The WRSS maintains contact with external agencies such as Access for Higher Education and Disability, National Access Office and the Dyslexia Association of Ireland.



- In 2008/2009, 97 students with specific learning difficulties registered with the WRSS. This is an increase of 28% on the 2007/2008 figure of 76 students registering with the service.
- Figures released by the State Examinations Commission highlight a year-onyear increase in the number of students with disabilities sitting the Leaving Certificate. The likely continuing increase in the number of students with disabilities and SpLD's entering Higher Education has clear resource implications for the Institute.

Careers Advisory Service: Annual Report:

- The work of the Careers Advisory Service includes one-to-one meetings with students, student queries, classroom visits and careers presentations, Careers Education Programme lunchtime presentations and visiting speakers, employer contact including notifying job opportunities to students and graduates, Graduate Careers Fairs, development of databases to facilitate graduate and employer contact, Graduate Destinations Surveys.
- One-to-one career counselling appointments decreased by 10.24% to 183 for the year, covering areas including programme/subject choices, withdrawal/deferral from programmes, progression form Level 7 to 8, postgraduate study, job search strategies, working/travelling abroad, CV and applications, interviews, work experience, part-time/summer work and scholarships.
- 140 e-mail queries were received during the year an increasing number of queries are being answered through the phone and e-mail query services.
- The profile of the Careers Advisory Service continued to be raised within the Institute by through promotion of the service to students through classroom visits, the Student Union website, the 'future is Bright' handbook and Blackboard (VLE).
- The following mechanisms were used to notify students about the Careers Service activities:
 - Student Union website (especially jobs noticeboard section
 - Careers Service Database
 - Blackboard VLE the School of Business and Humanities has established a dedicated folder within their area for notices – it is hoped to establish similar folders for the School of Creative Arts and School of Creative Technologies within Blackboard in the coming year
 - Notice board throughout the Institute
 - 1st year student induction programme
- The Careers Education Programme offers a combination of lunchtime lectures and direct presentations to class groups (award year groups) – presentations included Career Planning, Postgraduate Research and Options and Careers



Resources and Support after leaving the Institute. Presentations by external speakers included presentations on Working Abroad and Teacher Training.

- The Graduate and Employer database held by the Careers Advisory to facilitate on-going communication with graduates and employers continued to be developed.
- The annual Graduate Destinations Survey of the 2007 graduate cohort was undertaken in 2008. This yielded useful data and follow-on surveys of first destinations of graduates will continue to be undertaken.

3.7.2 Student Union

In November 1998 the Student Union was formed at the Institute to represent the interests of students in their dealings with the Institute authorities, and to further the social and cultural life of students on campus. The Student Union is affiliated to USI. The President and Deputy President for the academic year 2008/09 were Ms. Ciara McIlraith and Mr. David Edwards respectively.



4. <u>Research and Development Activities</u>

4.1 **Developmental Activities**

4.1.1 General Developments

IADT Strategic Plan 2008-2012 – In 2007 Jane Williams of The Sia Group was engaged to facilitate this process which included extensive consultation with both internal and external stakeholders. On 6 February 2008, IADT's Governing Body approved 'Creating Futures', the Institute's strategy for the period 2008-2012. On 21 April 2008, the strategy was launched by Mary Hanafin TD, Minister for Education and Science. The plan contained new actions as well as incorporating the full range of day-to-day activities on-going within the Institute.

4.1.2 Projects

ENGAGE – The National Film School became a partner in ENGAGE which is a collaborative project funded by the EU Media Programme. ENGAGE is designed to help Film/TV students and graduates collaborate across frontiers. The NFS, Screen Academy Scotland (at Napier University in Edinburgh) and the Baltic Film & Media School from Tallinn, Estonia selected six participants from each of their institutions, plus six from elsewhere in Europe to attend three workshops. The first of these workshops took place in IADT on Friday, 11th April 2008.

Digital Cre8tor - The 'Digital Cre8tor' programme, developed by the British Computer Society, was introduced to schools and other learning settings through an exclusive arrangement between IADT and BCS. Through this programme, participants can develop a range of digital creative skills, complete creative projects and submit them for assessment online. Ciaran McCormack (FIS) led the project which was extensively supported by Apple

EuroCreator – this project was led across Europe by IADT, and aimed to encourage all children with support from their teachers to create an item of media and to submit this on-line (through a portal which was developed by IADT) during 2009 the European year of Creativity and Innovation. Each participant received a digital certificate signed by Commissioner Jan Figel, European Commissioner responsible for education, training, culture and youth. The EuroCreator Road Show took place at IADT on Thursday March 12th. Batt O'Keeffe TD, Minister for Education and Science presented the first set of EuroCreator certificates to participants at an event to be held in April 2009.

FÍS Festival - The fourth annual FÍS Film Festival took place in November 2008. This Festival is a celebration of the creativity and imagination of children and teachers in Irish schools. The annual event sees schools from all over Ireland



creating short films from animations, documentaries to educational dramas. A number of schools are then invited to the FÍS Festival – the Irish schools Film Award Ceremony.

DRHEA - The Dublin Regional Higher Education Alliance 'DRHEA' was launched on 14th May, 2009 by Batt O'Keeffe TD, Minister of Education and Science. DRHEA is a project funded under SIF2 and IADT is very pleased to be a collaborating partner. The DRHEA is a strategic alliance of the Higher Education sector in the wider Dublin city-region (including TCD, UCD, DCU, NUIM, DIT, IADT, ITB AND ITT) and was created to strengthen the region's higher education sector as an important contribution to the growth of Dublin's competitive advantage in a European and broader context of national development. IADT benefits from all areas of the project and has specific funding and activities under the 'Enhancement of Learning ' theme.

dViz/Vizi Project - In 2009, the Vizi project commenced in the National Digital Research Centre, with Hilary Kenna as the IADT lead researcher. This is an online platform to facilitate the contextualisation of statistical data in real time using dynamic visualisation technology. The ultimate objective of this project is to unlock the value of data by creating a platform that will enable users to visualise, manipulate and track data in a way that is meaningful for them. The resultant dynamic visualisations can then be used to investigate causal relationships to influence decision and policy making with evidence based conclusions. The project is a partnership between NDRC, Twelve Horses Ltd, IADT and UCD.

CAVE System – Funding of €560K has been awarded by Enterprise Ireland through the Research Infrastructure Grant, to fund a CAVE System at IADT. This is an immersive virtual reality system which immerses users in ambionic sounds and high-end 3D graphic environments projected on four walls. The system also uses a wireless motion tracking system to support research in: cyber-psychology and cognitive studies, real-time visualisation and interaction, high-end interactive graphics, and prototypes for niche sectors such as planning and visual arts.

Community Digital Media Centre - This is a FIS initiative, funded through the Dormant Accounts Scheme and was launched by Barry Andrews TD, Minister for Education and Science on 18th May, 2009.



4.2 External Development Links

Creating Futures Conference - On 29th October 2008, IADT hosted the conference 'Creating Futures: Building Ireland's Cultural and Creative Economy' which acted as a prelude to the European Year of Creativity and Innovation in 2009. The aim of the conference was to bring together policy makers, decision makers and the leaders and professionals in the fields of practice that collectively make up the cultural and creative industries and to highlight their current and potential contribution to economic growth and activity in Ireland.

Temasek Polytechnic - A group of students from Temasek Polytechnic, Singapore, visited IADT for two weeks from 15th to 29th September to work with the Institute's film students. A second group of students visited from 17th to 28th November 2008 and participated in further collaborative projects.

FÍS Festival

The fourth annual FÍS Film Festival took place on 19th November 2008. This Festival is a celebration of the creativity and imagination of children and teachers in Irish schools. The annual event sees schools from all over Ireland creating short films from animations, documentaries to educational dramas. A number of schools are then invited to the FÍS Festival – the Irish schools Film Award Ceremony.

Filmsense Symposium - On Friday, 24th April, 2009 the National Film School (NFS) and the Graduate School of Creative Arts and Media (GradCAM) hosted 'Filmsense', a symposium concerned with film and education, organised by Dr Elaine Sisson and Donald Taylor Black. The panel was composed of various international media organisations (London Film School, Screen Academy Scotland and FAMU in Prague).

Catholicism and Public Culture in Ireland, France, the UK and North America - IADT hosted the above conference from 17th to 19th June 2009, cosponsored by the Centre for Public Culture Studies, IADT, the Kucera Center for Catholic Thought at Loras College (Iowa) and the National Centre for Franco-Irish Studies at I.T. Tallaght. This interdisciplinary conference investigated the Catholic Church as an institution and as text in the context of the countries mentioned above, but with particular reference to Ireland. Speakers included James Donnelly (Professor Emeritus of History at the University of Wisconsin), Dr Daryl Jones (Dept. of English, TCD), Martin McLoone (Professor of Media Studies at the University of Ulster), Patsy McGarry (Religious Affairs Correspondent, The Irish Times), and Mary Reichardt (Professor of Catholic Studies and Literature at the University of St. Thomas).



4.3 <u>Campus Development</u>

Monkstown Educate Together National School (METNS) - In March 2006 a Memorandum of Understanding was signed by IADT and the Department of Education and Science which released a two-acre site for the construction a primary school building for the Monkstown Educate Together National School. In return for this site, the Department of Education and Science undertook infrastructural works to the IADT campus, and provided an all-weather playing pitch. Pupils began attending the new school building in November 2008.

National Film School - In March 2007, the Development Committee for the National Film School (NFS) initiated a fundraising campaign and a total of \in 110,000 was raised. This funding will go towards the cost of equipping the new NFS building, when completed. On 12th May 2008, IADT's NFS development programme was launched, and in November 2008, the Institute received permission from the Department of Education and Science to submit the NFS building for planning permission which was later granted during the summer of 2009

All Weather Sports Pitch - On 25th March, 2009 the Institute's All Weather Sports Pitch was officially opened by Mr. Packie Bonner, FAI Director of Development and former Republic of Ireland Goalkeeper.



4.4 Safety Management

The Health & Safety Committee acts as an advisory committee to the Executive Management Team on all aspects of safety, health and welfare, in relation to staff, students, visitors and contractors. On 28th November, 2008 fire drills were held in all campus buildings, with evacuation times as follows:

In March 2009, training was provided to Caretaking staff on elevated works platform operation.

In August 2009, a specific working group was established to manage the H1N1 pandemic and an additional medical advisory group was also established.

In the same month, the Institute's Critical Incident Protocol was implemented to deal with a crisis following the death of one student and the injury to a second student in an off-campus incident.

During the academic year 2008/09, risk assessment procedures to support a Pregnant Employee were completed and new protocols were rolled out. During the year, routine testing and sterilisation was carried out on all tanks and water sources to ensure that the water was of suitable quality and free from legionella in accordance with relevant regulations. Testing was also completed on all portable appliances in all campus buildings on an annual and cyclical basis
