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There are 60 places available for the on campus workshops in Cork on 16 June.

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There are 100 places available for the two virtual CASS workshops on 17th and 24th June. The virtual programme is open to applicants who cannot attend the in-person Dublin CASS.

This exciting project, funded by the Department of Education and Skills Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH) fund is a collaboration between the National College of Art and Design, Trinity College Dublin, Marino Institute of Education, University College Dublin, Institute of Art, Design and Technology, RCSI University of Medicine and Science and MTU Crawford College of Art and MTU Cork School of Music. You will have the opportunity to participate in a programme that will include a range of explorative creative arts workshops, campus tours, admissions information, creative course options, academic, financial, disability and learning supports and guidance on creative career opportunities.

NCAD Workshops

Monday 13th June

Ever wondered how an iPhone is designed or a website is created? Are you interested in animation, textile design or graphics?

Design Works! will introduce you to what designers actually do and explain the variety of design courses that can be studied in the National College of Art & Design. This two-hour workshop will give participants an overview of what it really means to design for humans across a range of design disciplines from product and fashion design, to illustration and jewellery.

Using a mixture of activities, videos and interactive discussion, participants will be introduced to the human centered design process and the step by step methods used to transfer ideas into the physical objects, experiences and media that we are surrounded by in our daily lives.

The workshop will outline the various design disciplines that can be pursued in NCAD's School of Design at both undergraduate and postgraduate level and demonstrate the career opportunities available to graduates with examples of former students who have gone on to productive and rewarding careers in a diverse range of design fields.

Monday 13th June

'process at play' will introduce students to the creative process involved in the preparation and production of a portfolio of work, for applying to 3rd level visual arts courses. Emphasis will be on brainstorming/mind-mapping, visual research, process and ideas generation. Participants will identify the process involved in producing a collection of works, how visual research can be presented through notebooks, worksheets and resolved pieces and how this research can produce new and exciting creative outcomes.

Following on from this, participants will explore the hands-on production of zines and hand-made books. Using a range of materials participants will playfully explore a range of processes, including collage and layering, using sketches with printed and photocopied cut-outs.

NCAD Workshops **Monday** 13th June

This workshop creates a safe space for participants to explore writing, poetry, and collage. Using the world around us as inspiration and paper as a tool, participants will turn the materials provided to them into something new and exciting. Participants will spend the beginning of the workshop developing found poems by repurposing old poems, novels, newspapers, and other pieces of text. Then, participants will spend the second half of the workshop creating collages from things like old magazines, textbooks, and photographs. Students will end the day by combining their collages and poems, creating mixed media collages - just like those made by Picasso and Braque!

The outcome will be a Self - Portrait which you will create from a selfie taken on your phone. You will be supported during each of the exercises to realise the image. This introductory session will give you the tools and knowledge to continue your learning on the subject.

Wednesday 15th June

No technology is as essential or integral to the human experience as that of language.

It is the foundation upon which communities, societies, and civilizations are built; it is how knowledge is passed, ideas are exchanged, and history is recorded. But there are those who use language in a deeper, more mystical way— who push it to its limits to make sense of the human experience and create meaning. These practitioners of language are the ones we count on to tell us who and what we are; they are novelists, poets, authors, writers.

In this workshop we invite you into the Oscar Wilde Centre for Creative Writing to test out some of the techniques and tools writers use to impact their audience with powerful characters or stunning verse. We'll take a survey of poetic language, scene-writing, and character creation in a series of instructive talks and generative exercises that will equip you to succeed on your journey as a creative writer. During our time together we hope to foster your ambitions for writing and encourage creative use of language with constructive feedback, while giving you a taste of exactly what an academic workshop looks like.

Students will work with David Lunney, a regular contributor to the Douglas Hyde Gallery at Trinity College Dublin. The workshop will explore David's string wrapping processes. In the practice, all surfaces are decorated and adorned, often with neat rows of colourful strings, wools, ribbons and beads, giving students a practical insight into how an artist works.

The Lir Academy is the national academy for dramatic art, established to offer courses and training across theatre, film, TV and related industries. This voice workshop will give students an insight into the type of courses and training offered within the dramatic arts, while also helping students to build skills which will have a personal impact, supporting their public speaking and confidence.

The Trinity College Dublin School for Creative Arts will hold a mini-film school workshop. Using your own smart phone, you'll be learning some basic filming techniques. You'll work in groups to film a short scene taking on either the role of one of the actors, the cameraperson or the director. No experience necessary. It's all about creative play!

Thursday 16th June

This workshop is designed to introduce beginners to the process of Monoprinting. A monoprint, unlike other forms of print making, produces a single impression of an image. Using oil pastels each participant will be introduced to the concept of mark making using the different tools available to them to create variations of line and tone. Participants will also be given the opportunity to produce a more unique and considered print.

Sculpture Elements

Thursday 16th June

In this workshop participants will explore constructional and sculptural techniques, with the use of sustainable and recycled materials participants will create artwork in 3 dimensions.

Thursday 16th June

This workshop will be based in MTU Cork School of Music, exploring rhythm and the elements that create the magic of music.

Drawing the Figure

Thursday 16th June

This workshop examines the human body in motion through traditional and experimental drawing exercises. Suitable for beginners and experienced artists, participants will learn about anatomical ratios and how the body moves through the production of a series of observational drawings with an emphasis on gesture, tension, and momentum.



IADT Workshops Monday 20th June

Participants in this workshop will gain an insight into drawing for animation. This two-hour interactive workshop will give students an introduction to gesture drawing and will create work that could be added to their portfolio. Participants will also be given an overview of the course content in IADT animation.

Monday 20th June

This workshop will introduce participants to the fascinating world of the darkroom and pinhole photography. By exploring the fundamentals of photography, students will explore various of ways of making images and learn how to process prints in a professional darkroom. This interactive and hands on workshop gives you the chance to experience photography in a totally new way and go home with a one-of-a-kind artwork.

IADT Workshops Monday 20th June

This workshop will introduce participants to the diverse industry of model making and set design through a variety of creative practices. It will also showcase the broad range of specialised skills that you will learn in any of IADT's creative courses.

Monday 20th June

Visitors to the studio will come away with a wide idea of the potential of print media across disciplines as well as some take home works on paper.

The uses of print have changed through the digital era but contrary to many expectations, the adaptations of print have expanded. Print can be used in illustrations, books, media and traditional gallery works. It may also be used to create patterns on textiles used in furnishings, fashion and costume. It may be used in ceramics to decorate slabs of clay and tiles. It may be used to print conductive inks that turn any surface into interactive installation transmitting sound and light. The possibilities are endless and we keep discovering new potential. Through visual examples and explanations we will explore and discuss some of the things participants may want to pursue within print at third level.

Following on from this there will be some prepared examples set up ready for people to try their hand as printers. The format for this workshop will be to make a short zine of patterns and pictures from the images, shapes and colours provided. Depending on placements, overlays and methods no two people's zines will end up the same. The focus will be on experiment and play; not too serious but just for the joy of making physical art works that we can hold and take with us. Visitors will leave with their zine, an understanding of expanded print media and some tips and tricks to making DIY works at home.



RCSI Workshops Tuesday 21st June

In this workshop you'll meet Eoin Kelleher who is an illustrator and doctor. Eoin's Journey Through The Body: A Visual Exploration is an immersive book that brings the body to life. Going beyond realistic depictions of human anatomy, it brings the reader on an immersive trip around the body's organs, with imaginative illustrations that are no just enjoyable but also explain how the body works. These illustrations reimagine the human body, drawing inspiration from a wide variety of artistic styles, from Pop Art to Surrealism. It is thought that the right side of the brain is responsible for creative traits such as musicality and artistic talent whereas the left hemisphere is more heavily involved in logical tasks such as in mathematics and language. Using evocative visual metaphors, Eoin will reveal how our brains work and the connections between our brains and our emotions, while colouring with you.

Inspired by the world of special effects and informed by science - the RCSI SIMULATION (SIM) Team crafts and creates immersive learning experiences. This workshop will explore the tools, techniques, and technologies we use to simulate real-world illnesses, scenarios and surgeries. Learn how the RCSI SIM build eyes from scratch, create convincing costumes and make fake bodies feel real using everything from makeup to meat. You will build an eye from scratch with the SIM TEAM and learn about a medical procedure used to take pressure off the eye in a simulated environment.

Getting under your skin – using dye to stain skin samples in a lab **Tutor: Tony O'Grady**



RCSI Workshops

Tuesday 21st June

What does it look like under the microscope when normal skin changes to become skin cancer?

Cancer can start anywhere in the body. Melanoma is a deadly form of skin cancer that develops when skin cells grow out of control. When the doctor finds a suspicious spot on the skin that looks like a melanoma, they perform a skin biopsy. This involves giving an injection to numb the area and then removing all (or part of) the spot. The skin sample is then sent to a Hospital laboratory, where a scientist cuts a thin slice of the skin and another doctor examines it under a microscope to confirm if it's a melanoma and how far it may have spread.

This workshop will give you the opportunity to use a dye extracted from a tree found in Central America and another dye used in the cosmetic industry to stain a sample of skin and a sample of brain. After staining the 2 samples you will examine them under a microscope and learn what normal skin looks like and how it changes to become melanoma. In addition you will see what melanoma looks like when it travels to other parts of the body such as the brain.

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MIE Workshops

Wednesday 22nd June

Students will use viewfinders to gather visual information from around the MIE campus environment, creating simple pictorial compositions and translating these into colour pattern contrasts in the art room based on significant historical colour models.

Exploring the environment through drama

Wednesday 22nd June

Students will participate in drama and theatre games, and will explore the theme of environment through process drama. Participants will take on roles, problem solve and meet some interesting characters along the way!

Wednesday 22nd June

This music workshop explores the relationships between sounds, sights and colour. In multisensory ways musical sounds are created and coloured through students explorations of sights, sounds of the environment culminating in group music making and improvisation.

UCD Workshops Thursday 23rd June

This workshop will introduce students to the multidisciplinary subject of Classics, which explores the ancient world of Greece and Rome (and the far-flung places with which these interacted!) from many different angles, including art, literature, archaeology, and social and political history! As well as an understanding of the ancient world, studying Classics allows us to gain insight into how numerous concepts and aspects of the modern world have been adopted and adapted from the ancient past. In fact, every day we encounter echoes of the ancient world in our political systems, languages, architecture, literature, art, culture and society. In this workshop, through a series of engaging activities students will be introduced to Classics by considering the close relationship between the modern and ancient worlds, examining how present the ancient past still is today!

Thursday 23rd June

Explore Creative Writing at UCD, with a workshop hosted by two of UCD's recent writers in residence. Through a series of creative writing exercises you will explore your inner world, get ideas out of your head, and onto the page. UCD Workshops Thursday 23rd June

This workshop will take place in the UCD College of Science Artist in Residence, a studio space, in an old classroom in the School of Biology and Environmental Science. Lorna Donlon will demonstrate tapestry weaving, the oldest form of weaving, and will offer students the chance to briefly try their hand at it themselves. Tapestry weaving is a narrative art, and Lorna will explain how she uses tapestries to tell stories and makes designs for tapestries using collage. On display in the studio will be a selection of objects belonging to a group of UCD researchers. Some of these objects relate to their research, while some of them are everyday objects of personal value to them. We will discuss how objects tell stories and consider what objects are important to each of us and why, by making a small collage in honour of our object of choice. Having worked as a tapestry weaver and artist all her life, in 2016 Lorna decided she didn't want to work as an artist anymore. She did the Access to Science and Engineering Course in UCD and went on to study science in UCD. During the first lockdown in May of 2020 she achieved a 1st class degree in Cell and Molecular Biology in UCD. Little did she know that a few months later she would end up working as an artist again, in UCD's College of Science.

Thursday 23rd June

Participants in this practical studio based workshop will be introduced to the architectural concept of scale and the fundamentals of human inhabitation of space. Through the construction of a cardboard model to scale they will explore the relationship of the human figure in a space of their own design.
