What is Academic Integrity?

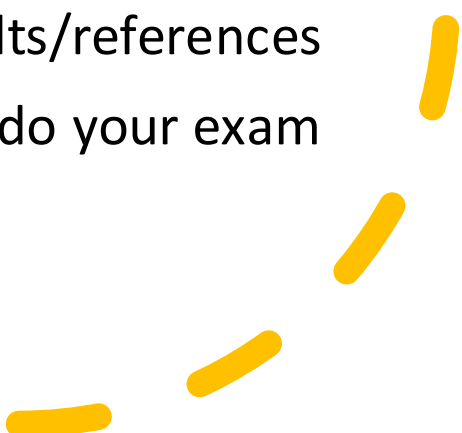
- "compliance with ethical and professional principles, standards, practices and consistent system of values, that serve as guidance for making decisions and taking actions in education, research and scholarship" (National Academic Integrity Network (NAIN), Lexicon of Common Terms, 2021)
- "The commitment to, and demonstration of, honest and moral behaviour in an academic setting" (from Mooney, 2019, as quoted in NAIN, 2021)

Types of Academic Misconduct

- Plagiarism – using other people’s work/ideas without referencing
 - Misuse of Artificial Intelligence
 - Self-Plagiarism – using your work in several assignments
 - Collusion – working together rather than individually
 - Contract cheating – using essay mills/online tutors/friends to do your work for you
 - Unequal group work – not participating but attempting to get credit
 - Fabrication/Falsification – making up results/references
 - Impersonation – getting someone else to do your exam

Consequences of Academic Misconduct



Lack of learning, performing well or knowing your subject matter



Diminished self-confidence, imposter syndrome, feeling unworthy



Less prepared to get a job or further studies



Lose marks/Fail/Breach on student record/Exclusion from course



Reputation affected; career prospects damaged



The validity of other work done could be called into question



Legal action in professional life



Blackmail

Why should we act with Academic Integrity?



Will learn and perform better, know your subject matter



More likely to get a job/further study via interview



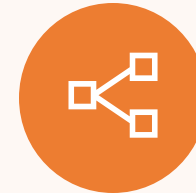
Good reputation, peer-reviewed



Pride in your work, academic achievements



Professional



Trustworthy



Impartial



Builds confidence and self-esteem

Reasons why people engage in Academic Misconduct



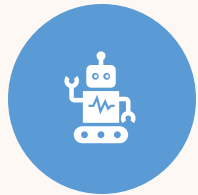
Feeling under pressure, poor time management



Haven't been taught how to reference (quotations/summaries/paraphrase)



Lack of awareness of what is/is not a Academic Misconduct



Not aware that Artificial Intelligence tool is embedded (e.g. Bing search results/Word/Grammarly suggestions)



Overwhelmed by online search results

Advice – how to prepare



Close reading of the brief/assignment for understanding



Contact lecturers if you don't understand the assignment



Plan and think about where you are going to find the time around college/work/family commitments



Schedule time to research/review, think/understand, plan, reflect, revise, edit and proofread.



Scan texts for relevant parts



Use bullet points/mind maps to take notes of the main points



Go back to the brief with your draft - does your work answer the question/problem/follow the direction/fulfill the rubric



Proofread before submitting



Admit your mistakes – practice honesty and carefulness – everyone makes mistakes, it's how we learn!

Student Personal Experience

Some key points I've learned:

- Academic Integrity Principles apply to ALL courses – even film and creative ones!
- They are not meant to be scary; they're here to help you learn
- Referencing: keep track of everything as you do it
- Use IADT Library online resources!! (JSTOR, eBooks etc.)
- Notebooks for all your ideas
- Keep it simple



How to reference – quick overview



Check what referencing system/style to use (different for different disciplines) – Ask your lecturer if it's not on the brief/assignment



Check out the Lib-Guide on referencing:

Record references as you take notes using software referencing tools such as Word/Zotero



Better to locate and cite original text rather than secondary source



Full reference should be in the bibliography at the end of the assignment



Reference both academic and non-academic sources

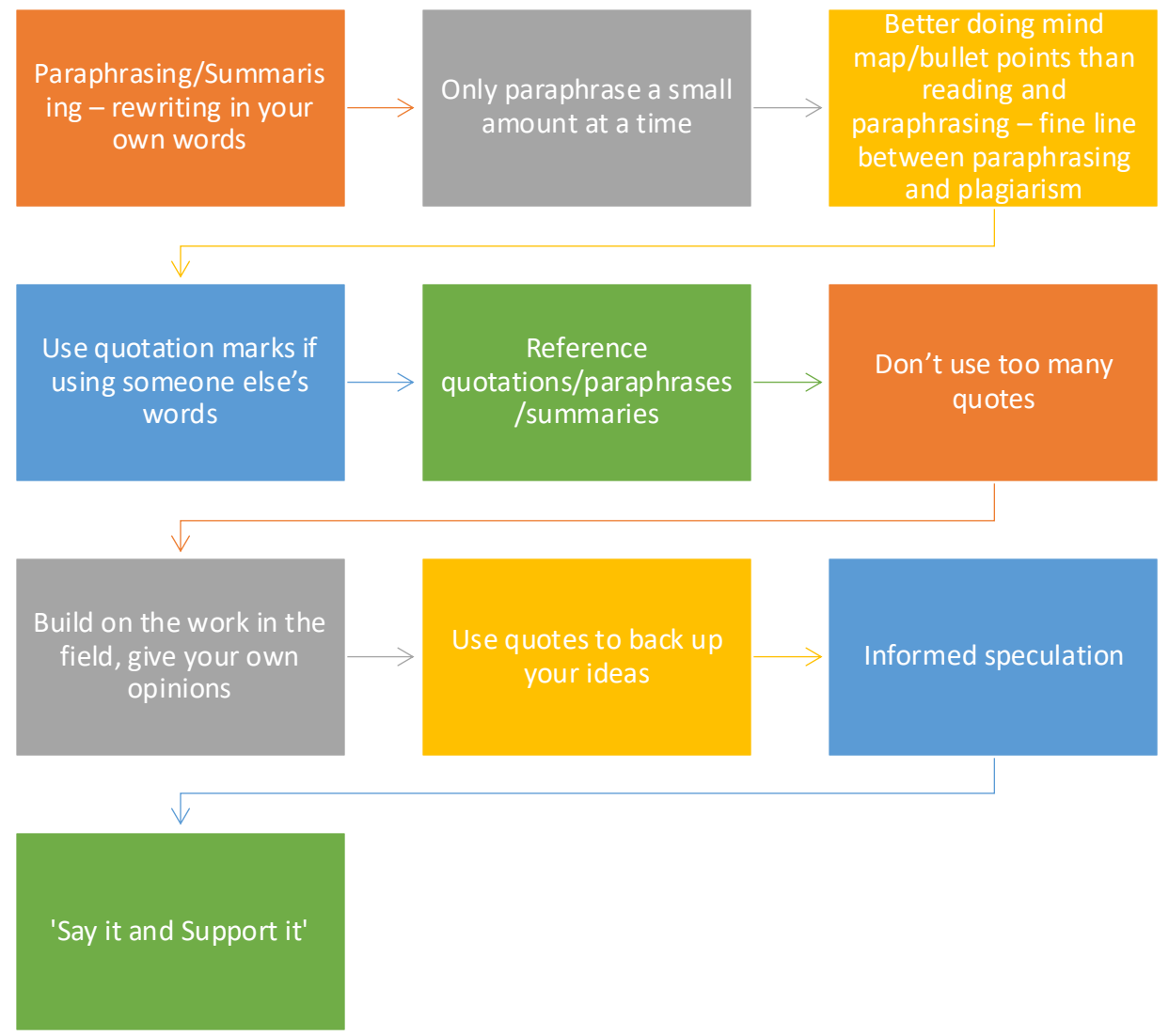


Reference ideas as well as quotes/media

Multimedia

- Need to reference digital media (images/videos)
- Check the copyright permission before you use a media asset (especially if the production could be in the public realm)
- Creative Commons – licenses and copyright permissions for creative and academic works to ensure proper attribution/enable others to copy/distribute or make use of them (<https://creativecommons.org/about>, 2023)

Quotations/Paraphrasing advice



Good referencing

Use highly cited peer-reviewed papers, Irish Times or similar, CSO, Government sites, etc.

Always explain terminologies and acronyms as they appear, write for someone who doesn't know anything! Never assume the reader knows the acronyms/definitions.

The academic qualifications of the author in the field are important. Just because an author is highly qualified in one field doesn't make them an expert in another (Covid19 – everyone thought they were an expert!)

You should understand your quotes, be prepared to be questioned

Contact library/student Learning Centre for assistance

Use Academic resources (via library- EBSCO Host- Bodelian search)

Ensuring that you have adhered to Academic Integrity



Check your work with text-matching software (e.g., TurnItIn)



Ask for help from lecturers (maybe request a walk-through of the assignment or exemplars)



Inform the Lecturer if you think someone is breaching Academic Integrity rules



Inform the lecturer if you have used Artificial Intelligence (like Grammarly/translate etc.)



Do not use Generative Artificial Intelligence tools unless specifically sanctioned by your lecturer on the brief/assignment



Ask for support if a group member isn't doing their share of the work

Artificial Intelligence



Generative AI (such as ChatGPT, Bard, Bing, Dall-E...) chatbots that use Large Language Models (LLMs) to provide responses to users' prompts



AI may disseminate inaccurate, biased, or incorrect information, and we cannot treat it as a source of truth



The standard version of ChatGPT has a current knowledge cut-off from September 2021



They do not include Pay to access journals and academic papers, Newspapers behind paywalls or Books, Films, photographs and audio recordings with copyright



Inform the lecturer if you are thinking of using Artificial Intelligence in the assignment

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Academic Integrity Case Study 2

FOUR STUDENTS ARE DOING A GROUP PROJECT.



They have left it very late to meet and have just one day left to complete the project.



Three project members, Diarmaid, Aoife and Sahas, have arrived at the agreed time, but Bethany is late.



Diarmaid wants to assign the roles of researcher, writers and presenter for the project.



Aoife thinks they should wait and discuss it together.



Bethany finally messages, she needs to have emergency surgery and won't be able to do any of the work on the project.

She asks the others to do the work and include her name on the project.

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**ANGIE, BENNY, AND DOMINIC ARE TAKING
QUANTITATIVE DATA ANALYSIS.**



They each have to write up a quantitative results section from a set of results they have been given.

They feel this is okay because the formal structure of writing up quantitative results means their work should look almost the same anyway.
